SUBJECT SELECTION EVENING

A large number of students and parents took the opportunity to attend our information evening. Some excellent subject display booths were evidence of the passion and interest our teachers have for their subjects and the enthusiasm with which we can promote the widest subject choice available to students on the Central Coast.

YEAR 9 GRADUATION CERTIFICATE

The Year 9 Graduation Certificate will be finalised in Term 4. It is a great concept that was introduced last year to recognise Year 9 students who display all of the core values that we see as so important in their development as young adults.

Students have been given a self - evaluation checklist to assist in recognising their current standing and plan for progress in required areas for the rest of the year. Team Leaders have interviewed students to assist them in reaching their potential.

This unique certification makes a valuable contribution to mark a critical mid point in a student's journey through our College.

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CREATIVE & PERFORMING ARTS

The CAPA Program continues its momentum after a slight rest break early in the term.

UNIFORM – It Looks Great: Parents and Students please help keep it that way

Thank you to all parents who have already supported our drive to maintain an excellent school uniform. It will only be sustained if teachers, parents and students maintain the effort to make our school look as great as it does now. Most Parents have obviously gone to the effort of purchasing full uniform (including ENCLOSED BLACK LEATHER SHOES). Please make sure students arrive at school in full uniform



Correct BLACK Shoes

As mentioned in the letter sent to all parents last year, only <u>enclosed leather black shoes</u> will be permitted as we respond to the identified OH&S risk in all areas of the school. Failure to wear appropriate footwear will prohibit a child's participation in key subjects that must be completed in order to meet School Certificate requirements. **Even** on mufti days, students must have enclosed footwear.

We ask that all parents support this important aspect of developing school image, safety and self esteem amongst our school community. It requires a combined effort by staff, parents and students to reach the standards we want for our school.

Students should not wear white sports shoes to school on sports or PE days as this undermines the uniform, especially as large numbers of students have these activities each day. Students have been informed that they could either bring white sports shoes in their bag or have a pair of black leather track shoes that can be worn all day.

PLEASE NOTE:

Plain Blue Skirts & Polo Shirts are not part of the Umina Campus Uniform. The tartan skirt can be worn at both the junior and senior campus in Year 10.

Full school uniform will be a requirement for attendance at school excursions. *Financial assistance is available to families in need, by contacting the principal and completing a student assistance application.*

OUT OF UNIFORM NOTES FROM PARENTS.

If a student is unable to wear uniform on a particular day, we ask that parents provide a note indicating the problem and when the student will be back in uniform. This makes it easy to distinguish from some students who may choose not to wear uniform. This should be shown to the roll teacher and others who may enquire during the day.

ALL NOTES – whether for absences, uniform or any other reason must be written entirely by the parent / guardian – not written by the student and merely signed by an adult. This makes it harder for bogus notes to be presented, as sometimes occurs.

Important Notice to Parents

Brisbane Water Police Information re Cancellation of Terrigal End of Term Year 12 Event for 2012—Thursday 20/9/12

In previous years the end of term 3 has signalled a commencement of festivities on the last day of school and before Year 12's HSC. Students have been for some years now congregating at Terrigal Surf club car park for a free organised alcohol free event with live music and fun.

This event has been privately organised with support from Gosford Council. Unfortunately this year organisers have informed Gosford Council that they have decided not to run the event this year. Therefore there will be NO organised activities in Terrigal CBD or any other venue in Brisbane Water Command.

Brisbane Water Police have always maintained a large Operation to correspond with the Terrigal Year 12 event to address crowd control, alcohol and anti-social behaviour thus ensuring a safe environment for the young persons to celebrate whilst minimising the affect on the community. Due to the cancellation of any organised activity / Event this year; Brisbane Water Police advise all students, Parents and community that there will still be a high Police presence especially along the beach front areas to deter any trouble makers. Police remind the community that all beachfront areas and public places are alcohol free zones which Police will be strictly enforcing.

Police remind the Community that if any person is seen in designated/ signposted alcohol free zones including Terrigal CBD, Police will be confiscating and under the legislation tipping out their alcohol. Any person deemed to be loitering will be moved on from those areas.

Brisbane Water Secondary College cattle club and agriculture students were very busy training and preparing cattle for the Brisbane Royal Show in early August, undoubtedly the biggest and most prestigious cattle show nationally of the year.

Two pure bred limousins were provided to the school by the highly acclaimed breeders Mr and Mrs Tomkins of Seaham NSW.

Allana Norris represented the school parading the cattle for competition and competing in Junior Judging and Paraders classes.

The limousin cattle placed 6th in the lightweight class and 8th in the middle-weight class in an unprecedented quality field.

The Ken McDonald Trophy is a highly esteemed competition exclusive to Brisbane Royal where three of the highest performing steers of each breed are selected to form a team which competes against the other breeds for the trophy. Two of the three selected to represent the Limousin breed included the BWSC / Tomkins steers.

The Limousin team competed successfully to win the trophy.

Thirty schools from Sydney, the Central Coast and Hunter regions attended with in excess of 70 cattle competing on the day. Thirty enthusiastic students from Years 7-10 represented the school, with several attending their first show.

Chloe Sutherland led the BWSC on the Hoof Heifer to place first in the Middleweight class. The heifer then proceeded to win Reserve Champion of the Show.

Spring has arrived at the school farm with a diverse range of activities underway.









KWAC Report

SRC MUFTI DAY

The dress standard required for mufti days is smart casual.

No bare midriffs.

- These rules have been set by the SRC.
- No singlets or thin strapped tops showing bare shoulders allowed unless a cardigan or jumper is covering bare shoulder skin.
- There must be no visible bras or bra straps (including spaghetti style tops or dresses).

The 18th Biennale of Sydney

'Biennale' is the Italian word that means an event that occurs every two years. The Sydney Biennale showcases contemporary visual art, architecture and design. The world's first Biennale was held in Venice in 1895 and Sydney had its first Biennale in 1973.


