




Dear Parents.

Reviewing and Editing: correcting errors and incorporating literary devices and other criteria requirements Preparing a summary sheet of the published narrative and learning this for the in-class task. At this point, your child will be very familiar with their storyline, so the important elements to remember will be the literary devices such as descriptive vocabulary, dialogue commands, hyperbole, simile, metaphor, personification, alliteration and vocabulary that appeals to the five senses.

Homework is important and will help your child to feel confident on assessment day. Every student is expected to complete the tasks outlined above as part of their homework regime for English. We will be guiding the students through the creative writing process in their lessons, as we extend students' story writing abilities with units on character development, figures of speech and story atmosphere.









There are many ways you can help your child in relation to English at home:

You will find a good deal of information on the site to help you with English for your child. Some suggestions are:

- Provide them with a variety of reading material
- Talk to them about what they are reading
- Ask them to explain a story to you
- Read with them
- Test them on their spelling
- Complete crosswords and find-a-words with them
- Ask them to write a summary of what they did in class, making sure their spelling and punctuation is correct
- Play word games like Scrabble or Upwords
- There are spelling and vocabulary word games for phones, iPods and iPads

We hope this has been helpful to you and we look forward to another delightful term expanding the literary expertise of your child or children,


