


Brisbane Water Secondary College Wins Overall Champion at Wingham Beef Week

A record number of schools and pastoralists attended from throughout NSW representing 350 students and 130 cattle. The quality of cattle presented was of a very high standard providing an extremely competitive field.

BWSC Agriculture Department presented four cattle, achieving successful results as follows:

A diverse range of informative educational programs were conducted throughout the show which students found very interesting and beneficial.







All classes have been busy with assessments. Teachers have been happy with the effort students have put in. Keep up the good work!!!


It was great to see so many Team 7 students in attendance and participating at the Athletics Carnival. We even had some records being broken...congrats to Ti Ana in 771.


